How did we get here?

- 1. Liability Insurance Carrier conducted a Hazard Assessment 2011
 - a) Not all items addressed at that time
- 2. Liability Insurance Carrier repeated the Hazard Assessment September of 2016
 - a) Multiple items remained from original list
- 3. Knowledge of liability ------ Board action

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EXISTING SITE NEEDS / CONCERNS

1. New Bleachers at Haberkorn Field Site

- Insurance and safety reports recommend action is taken
- Structural review cost \$20,000 by Structural Engineer
- Cost to fix the existing grandstands, greater than providing new bleachers.
- Improvements at this site would still require busing for home games.
- Improvements at this site would benefit football program only.

2. Other Site Concerns at the Haberkorn Field site

- Existing track identified as hazard even to spectators.
- Track area has is not safe or functional for meets or activities use.
- Track area would be costly to repair or replace.
- Parking is limited on site.
- Multiple points of access contrary to recommendations of insurance and WIAA
- Field is in very poor condition standing water on field when it rains
- Supervision and safety of students
- Transportation of home team no locker room



1.Consolidate property and maintenance efforts

- Move all field sports to High School property (reduces insurance and transportation concerns).
- Eliminate maintenance of two competition natural turf field, at two sites to one synthetic turf surface.
- Create stadium elements at High School campus for multiple activities including: track, soccer, football, baseball, softball, PE classes, and summer recreation programs.

2.Grandstand & Press Box Improvements

- Move existing grandstands to east side.
- Construct new 1,500 seat bleacher and reuse existing press box.

3.Synthetic Turf Development

- Concussion pad reduces head injuries and lower/upper body extremities
- 4.Parking/Concession/Restroom Expansion





Big Picture of the District...

- 1. Sell existing lights or reuse at soccer practice fields to create 2nd venue option.
- 2. Campus Parking at Soccer Site, multifunction for all site uses.
- 3. Concessions / Restroom / Storage Building at Soccer Site.
- 4. Sell District Office Consolidate District Administration Uses at High School.
- 5. Utilize land sale, capital improvement allocations, and community efforts (fund raising and cost sharing) to fund the project Fiscal Responsibility







Three Options to Consider:

- 1. Invest ~\$730K in Haberkorn Field
 - a) Impacts small number of students/ athletes
- 2. Invest ~\$2.3M in High School Campus
 - a) Impacts large number of students/ athletes
- Invest ~\$3.1M in High School Campus and Soccer Facility
 - a) Impacts greatest number of students/ athletes



Takeaways from today...

- 1. The District must do something to address the safety of our students and community members.
- 2. The Proposed Athletic Complex will serve Soccer, Track, Football, Softball, Baseball, Physical Education, and possibly summer recreation activities.
- 3. The District has considered the "big picture" of District needs, not just the football field in isolation.
- 4. A new facility on campus would reflect the high quality District and Community that Waupaca has become known to be.
